**JOHNSON TO GET RECOUNT IN NEW JERSEY ELECTION**

Newark, May 1.—Chief Justice Gamblers, of the supreme court, today signed the order for the recount of votes cast in last Tuesday's primary for Senator Johnson and General Wood.

### COMMUNICATED

In the past the matter of municipal water and lights for the city of Grants Pass has been much talked of. In fact, at one time W. J. Roberts an eminent municipal water and light engineer looked into this matter for our city dads and made a favorable report. Mr. Roberts has been for several years past chief engineer for Tacoma, Wash., and through his advice Tacoma now owns their own water and light systems, and the following appears in the press news:

"Tacoma, Wash., Apr. 27.—More than \$80,000 profits were made by the city of Tacoma in March from the light and water departments. The light department is the big money-maker, the profits amounting to \$71,365 on a business of \$101,284. The light profits since January 1, 1920, have been \$207,868. Water profits for March were \$11,327 on receipts of \$53,541."

It does seem to the writer that if such splendid returns can be obtained through municipally owned systems, it would be advantageous for Grants Pass to own both her own light and water system.
