SUPPORTING THE BAND
 A town without a brass band is like a dinner without salt. The band is the community seasoning. It adds spice to business and is the leavening of the people's recreation. Grants Pass has ample talent in its band organization, men who are willing to give their time to the making of a band, but it requires certain support from the community to make a successful band. This support must be of two kinds; it must be moral, and every citizen must feel a sense of pride in it, and it must be financial, for there is the obtaining of a competent leader to direct the

band, the purchase of music, and other incidental expenses that the individual members of the band should not be asked to meet. The moral support will certainly come. If the financial support can be arranged in a manner that will get away from the idea of the old-time subscription, it will be better for the peace of mind of all concerned, and the band men will feel more independent. It can be done by supporting the band in its concerts, by attending a series of municipally controlled dances to be given at the park, or by other means whereby the citizens will pay for amusement and entertainment. There is no doubting the desire of the community in this matter. The band will be given a proper support, but the support ought to be organized and certain.

SPEEDING AMERICANIZATION
 One hundred and seventeen Americanization classes is the proud re-

cord of one small town where there is considerable manufacturing and hence a large foreign element.

The classes are being held in churches, homes, boarding houses and schools, while every industrial plant has its branch devoted to the good work.

Nobody can read the papers and not be aware of the tremendous need for instruction in Americanism. Every investigation, every new labor problem points its warning finger in the same direction.

If every city and village and every cross-roads will take up its problem as this town has done, the work will go along swiftly enough to offset the crafty war to undermine American institutions which is being waged steadily through the length and breadth of this country. No spot should be neglected where the good seed can be sown. The farmer who hires a foreigner to milk his cow and the housewife who employs a laundress speaking an alien tongue have their share of responsibility in forwarding the work of Americanization.

It is only by the individual and concerted action of the loyal that America can be saved from those who seek to destroy her.

PUBLISHING DISCONTINUED
 One of the most encouraging signs of the times is found in the announcement of the joint committee on printing, of the senate and house, that 111 of the 226 journals, magazines and periodicals being published by the various branches of the government service have been discontinued during the past year. According to the report this will mean an annual saving of \$1,200,000 to the government. To the publishers of the country it will mean the release of a large amount of much-needed newspaper, and to the busy taxpayer it will mean a great saving of time and energy in packing government guff and propaganda out of his mail and putting it where it belongs—in the waste basket—Editor and Publisher (New York).
