THE ELECTION PAMPHLETS

The pamphlets covering the arguments for and against the measures and amendments submitted to the voters at the coming primary election and the statements of the candidates for nomination for the several positions to be filled at the November election, have been received by the voters during the past few days, or will be received within the next few days. Too often these pamphlets are consigned to the waste basket without consideration. But the voter can not do his duty as an American citizen, and the American system of self government will fail, if the individual does not take the time and the trouble to inform himself upon the issues and the men. There was a day when the party emblem at the head of the ticket guided the voter in casting his ballot. The other fellow was doing the thinking those days. But that time is of the past, and a "popular" election is now just what the term implies. It is now too late to get candidates upon the ballot for the primary election. So fill in the time between now and May 21st by making a careful survey of the situation, and support those who best suit your idea of the man who will make a good public official.

The election pamphlet now takes the place of personal solicitation to a very great extent, and unless it is taken seriously by the voter its publication is a loss of good money.
