financial return absolutely necessary and when it is not forthcoming, other and more lucrative work must be taken up. The millage tax is the measure of relief in the higher educational institutions, but the common schools will also have to find relief, as will also other paths of duty for the wage earner.

Now the employees of the federal government are getting active. The postal employees want the violet stamp, that served during the war, brought back on the job, and the increased funds used to keep the yelp of the work quieted from the door of the men who serve in the postal department. The campaign for the return of the violet stamp and increased wages is being supported by Judge Landis of Chicago. "During the war," he said, "I advised postal and other federal employees to hold off—to go easy—to stick to their jobs because we were at war, and when the war was over, I told them: 'I will go to the front for you and try to get justice.'"

So while we are adding millage to the taxes for the teachers, another campaign is being waged, just as necessary no doubt, to bring back the violet stamp with its added one cent of postage upon each letter, that the

postal worker may find his pay check increased to keep up with old H. C. L.
