THE COUNTY FAIR

There is one measure upon the pri-
mary election ballot that should
command the attention of every
voter in the county of Josephine.
The county fair as an institution
should receive every support that it
needs to make of the annual exposit-
ion a credit to the community.
There have been some most credit-
able fairs held in Josephine county
in years past, but much of the energy
of the fair board and of the interest-
ed citizens has had to go into tem-
porary arrangements that were lost
in the long run because there had
been no permanent grounds or build-
ings provided. Temporary quarters
and make-shift structures have been
the cause of more loss of finances
than permanent grounds would have
cost, and today we find the county
without a place in which to hold a
fair.

There will appear upon the bal-
lot through petition of the people a
measure that will provide the way
for permanent grounds and buildings
and the establishment of the county
fair upon a business-like basis that
will guarantee its success and its per-
manency. The measure provides
that for a period of three years a
county fair tax of one-fourth of a
mill be levied. This would produce
in the three years some \$6,000 which
it is estimated will purchase suitable
grounds and erect buildings. There-
after all the effort could go to the
making of the fair itself, and Jose-
phine would soon be on the map with
a county fair that will be a winner.
The cost during the three years to
the individual taxpayer would be
equivalent of a 25-cent admission
ticket upon each \$1000 of assessed
valuation. After the three-year per-
iod the fair would be more than self-
supporting.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the
Legislative Assembly
LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS
FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of
Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the
creation of debts and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities
for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the
amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property
in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.

**NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX
NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES
NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX**

Keep these three facts in mind. The present auto license fees and
gasoline tax will pay both the principal and interest on all the bonds
under this amendment, and will yield an annual surplus besides for other
state highway work. No additional taxation of any kind.

FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE MATCHED

Oregon must have sufficient Highway Funds to match Federal apportion-
ments or Oregon cannot get the benefit of Federal money for Oregon Roads.
Increasing this constitutional limit is a necessity. Unless limit is increased,
either state roads cannot be completed for many, many years, or must be finished
by direct property taxation. This measure averts direct property tax for state
highways and makes early completion possible. Let's get the roads built now.
