Tax Is Explained— Under a recent ruling by the treasury department the tax on toilet preparations and patent and proprietary medicines is based upon the selling price of each article and not upon the total price of a number of articles. If a person buys five packages of 5c cough drops, a 1c stamp must be attached to each package. If a person purchases a tube of tooth paste for 35c and a bottle of perfume for 65c, a 2c stamp must be placed on the tooth paste and 3c on the perfume, a total of 5c. In other words, the tax is on each article and not on the combined purchase price. This revokes a ruling previously made by the department.
