Higher Education in Oregon is Imperiled

The Agricultural College, State University, and State Normal School have 150 per cent more students than in 1913, but less than FOUR per cent more income. 2. The world-wide rise in costs has reduced tremendously the buying power of even that income. 3. There is no sign of a let-up in the increase of students. (It is well that there should not be, for the best educate state is the best producer, the most stable and the best to live in.) 4. Attendance has increased ten times as fast as classroom and laboratory space. 5. All three institutions have been conducted with utmost economy. Their cost per student per year and their building investment per student are far below the general average. 6. They are fast losing their faculty specialists, who cannot make even a bare living while training the boys and girls of Oregon. 7. Their classes are overloaded, their floor space overcrowded, their scientific instruments and apparatus low. 8. They can no longer go on with an adequate program of teaching unless adequate support is voted.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the Legislative Assembly.

303 No

LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, so as to permit the creation of debts and liabilities including previous debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.

NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX

Keep these three facts in mind. The present auto license fees and gasoline tax will pay both the principal and interest on all the bonds under this amendment, and will yield an annual surplus besides for other state highway work. No additional taxation of any kind.

FEDERAL FUNDS MUST BE MATCHED

Oregon must have sufficient Highway Funds to match Federal appropriations or Oregon cannot get the benefit of Federal money for Oregon Roads. Increasing this constitutional limit is a necessity. Unless limit is increased, either state roads cannot be completed for many, many years, or must be finished by direct property taxation. This measure averts direct property tax for state highways and makes early completion possible. Let's get the roads built now.

Income from Present Sources Sufficient to Pay Principal and Interest.

The fact that revenue from auto license fees and gasoline tax, without increase of present rates, will be ample to pay both principal and interest on these bonds, is clearly set forth by official figures on the State Pamphlet, mailed to every registered voter. Coral's Varying Colors.

Genuine coral may be red, pink, white, blue, yellow, green or black, the last being the rarest and most highly prized. The next valuable is the red coral, which is susceptible to a high polish and is most in use for jewelry, being the coral of commerce. Corals are roughly classed under two heads, the horny corals and the lime or stone corals. To the former belong the red and black forms and the white to the latter. Red coral is chiefly found in the Mediterranean. The corals found on the Atlantic coast of Florida are the lime, or stone corals, which are the reef-building forms.
