Returns to Farm—

L. M. West, miner from the Chetco district, who has been in the city for a day or two on business, left today for his home. Mr. West has recently purchased the farming and mining property on Kerby flat, below the mouth of Deer creek, and is growing quite a crop of potatoes and other "truck," on the 10 acres of garden ground. He contemplates the installation of equipment for the working of the placer ground this fall. Mr. West states that many prospectors have lately gone into the Chetco river district, being especially attracted by the low stage of water in the Chetco, and the fact that mining for platinum along the river bed will be a profitable undertaking this season because of the expectation that the water in the stream will reach the lowest level in history, and the pockets along the bed of the stream can be easily reached. The Chetco sands are especially rich in platinum.
