ROAD BUILDING CAN PROGRESS

Southern Oregon was vitally in-
terested in the recent election. The
district has long been more or less
isolated through lack of proper
transportation facilities, but with
the coming of the highway system, it
has been put into more direct touch
with the outer world. The building
of the Pacific highway and the Cres-
cent City highway will do more to
put the district upon the map than
could the building of more railroads,
and further development of each of
these routes was dependent upon a
favorable vote on the tax limitation
bill Friday. The vote is overwhelm-
ing in favor of further road building,
and the highway commission will no
doubt press the program to the limit
this present season. The traveler
who goes through the country by au-
tomobile sees the country and be-
comes acquainted with its possibili-
ties. Often he is a seeker of invest-
ments or of a home location.
