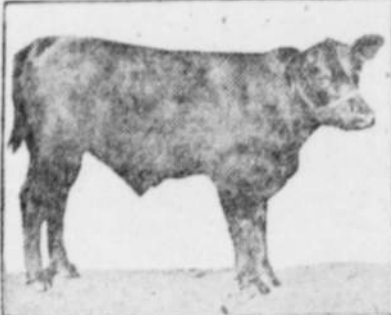
LIVE STOCK

BANK BOOSTS BETTER SIRE

Anxious to Assist Campaign in Every Way Possible—Offers to Finance Any Stockman.

The better sires campaign is attracting active attention on the Pacific coast. Recently the United States department of agriculture received a letter from a bank at Bend, Ore., containing the following statement: "We are anxious to assist this campaign in every way possible and have been conducting a live stock improvement campaign for some time. This bank has brought in 15 registered beef bulls since March 1, and we are now arranging for a carload of stockmen to go to the Pacific International at Portland. We have offered to finance any stockman in the county who wishes to purchase purebred sires while at the stock show. We wish to link up with your organization in this campaign in every way possible."

The department of agriculture is ready to enroll in the campaign any live stock owner who fills out the pre-

STAND BY PRESENT 'T B' PLAN

After two years of practical operation of the tuberculosis-free accredited herd plan, a joint committee representing the purebred cattle associations and the United States Live Stock Sanitary association has unanimously decided that no steps should be taken to lower the high standard of the present plan.

was agreed by the joint committee, to show that owners are exerting an effort to exterminate the disease, that a supplementary list be made to the accredited herd list to contain the names of the owners of purebred herds that are free from tuberculosis on two annual tests but in which the herd bull reacts. Such a herd will not receive an accredited herd certificate. The reacting bull may be used under certain conditions.

The accredited herd plan is administered by the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, in co-operation with the states.

STEERS FATTENED ON SILAGE

Interesting Feeding Test With Shelled Corn Conducted at Missouri Station.

At the Missouri experiment station one lot of steers was fed 15 pounds of shelled corn per head per day along with 25 pounds of linseed oil cake, 29 pounds of clover hay, and 25 pounds of corn silage. Another lot received no shelled corn but a little more of the oil cake and clover and 40 pounds of silage per head per day. The results were that the lot that received shelled corn and half a feed of silage charged \$15.95 for 100 pounds gain, while the other lot charged only \$10.69. The cost of feed per steer on shelled corn was \$50.23, while with the other lot it was \$21.17.

WATER SUPPLY FOR CALVES

Common Idea That Young Animals Will Drink Too Much Is Error—They Also Like Salt.

Let the calves have free access to fresh and clean water, and also to salt. The common idea that calves will drink too much water is a mistake. During the first four months little calves should not eat too much grain.

GOATS ADAPTED TO GRAZING

Animals Are Economical Producers Under Anything Like Ordinary Farm Conditions.

Angora goats are economical producers under anything like ordinary farm conditions. They are well adapted to grazing and can be maintained on rather thin pasture. Yet this is not desirable as a food.

Who Is My Neighbor?

A prominent New York business man who had become interested in charity once asked the late Jacob Rits to find for him a poor widow with five children the ages of his own children. He wished each of his children to be interested in another child that was growing along with him. Rits searched and found a poor woman in the tenements who was supporting her children by scrubbing the floor of a downtown office building. He asked her the address, and he discovered that she had been scrubbing floors in the very same building. In fact, the very same floor on which the business man worked. He had been searching for her, and lo, she had been working for him for years.—Boston Post.

British Premier.

The premier or prime minister of Great Britain, is nominated by the reigning sovereign. The king sends in the name of the leader of the party just successful at the polls and to that extent the appointment is dictated by the vote of the people. The sovereign appoints the prime minister to form a cabinet and organize the government. The appointment of premier does not have to be confirmed by parliament, but no prime minister could carry on the government of the country for any length of time who did not possess the confidence of the house of commons. He selects his colleagues or other members of the cabinet and his resignation dissolves the ministry.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Bat's Method of Climbing.

Certain bats appear to have found their hook-like thumbs and hind feet insufficient for suspension, and have made use of the suction principle for this purpose. This mode of suspension has been developed independently in two distinct bats, one a native of Brazil and the other of Madagascar. In the Brazilian species the suckers take the form of stalked discs attached to the palms of the thumbs and the soles of the feet. The suckers of the Malagasy species are horseshoe like. By means of the suckers these bats are able to ascend vertical surfaces. Very curious it is to note the similarity between the suckers of these bats and those on the arms of the cuttlefishes.

Beware Too Juvenile Potato

When potatoes are prematurely harvested they may prove dangerous to health. There have been several cases of poisoning from potatoes, the most recent being in Leipzig. The Journal of the American Medical Association says the green parts of potatoes contain a poison called solanin, 0.2 grammes of which is sufficient to produce bad results. There is always a minute quantity of this solanin in the tubers, but when these are mature never enough to do harm, unless they have sprouted and the sprouts have not been removed before cooking.

"Sycophant."

Sycophant is from a Greek word which, expressed in English letters, is written, sukophantes, meaning "flatterers." In ancient days democratic Athens passed a law forbidding the exportation of figs in order to keep down the prices. The law, of course, was evaded, but there were always found men fellows, who for reward or to win favor with the authorities, informed on exporters. They were called in contempt sukophantes, ("flatterers") or "informers," as we would say. Hence sycophant came to signify a government toady and then a toady generally.

Civil War Bred Colonels.

The distinguished mark that came out of the civil war was the military title agrandized. Men who entered the army as privates came out as captains and those who went in as officers came out as colonels or generals. A great many of these titles were self conferred, if we are to believe the confidential tales of the comrades of the recipients of these titles, but also a great many of them were conferred as brevets in a regular way and remained as the official title of the soldier concerned, even though he may never have exercised the actual authority his rank implied.
