A FAIR FOR 1920

By ballot at the late election the voice of the people has spoken in favor of a permanent fair for Josephine county. The agricultural fair held annually following the harvest season is one of the oldest established institutions in the United States. It has a place in the hearts of the people and properly conducted becomes the most popular occasion of the year. While the fact that the levying of a special tax for a period of years for the raising of funds for grounds and buildings does not put the county in the position of being able to purchase and pay for grounds immediately, nevertheless, if the situation could be financed, it is probable that thousands of dollars could be saved by purchasing grounds without delay. Values are now on the upgrade, and lands can never be obtained cheaper than right now. Building is another question, and the permanent buildings will have to come later. But the vote of the people has established the fair idea. The next thing is to provide the fair, and we believe the fair board is fully justified in proceeding with a fair for this fall even if permanent quarters have not yet been provided. There is something missing in the community life when the gates of the county fair are closed.

the educational crisis by which the nation has been confronted is seen in the provisions being made in the platforms of the great parties recognizing the urgent necessity of aid. The phase being taken up by the republican leaders for their platform displays an insight of real statesmanship in caring for the future. They begin at the top and provide a secretary of education to take his place on the president's cabinet, and continue with provisions for financial aid to state and community for combatting illiteracy and to establish Americanization plans.

But still more important is the recognition that the brunt of the whole educational battle is born by the far flung country districts, where no element but the public school system exists to effect the desired spread of American principles. Aid will be given direct to these localities, enabling them to continue the standard of education America has come to demand.

That part of the report covering this phase may be quoted in part: "The chief cause of inadequate public school facilities in many states and localities is the financial limitation of small school districts having but little taxable value, causing under-payment of teachers struggling to maintain high standards of education."

Old Indian Jail.
The old Wyandot Indian hewed-log jail which stood for 50 years on the west bank of the Sandusky river at Upper Sandusky, O., was the scene of one of the last Indian legal executions in Ohio. The jail was two stories in height. The entrance was from the north side through a heavy plank batten door on the outside and a grated iron door on the inside. The floors were of hewed eight-inch square lumber. In the summer of 1840 two Wyandots quarreled about a jug of whiskey, and one of them was killed. At the trial the whole Wyandot nation met in council and voted that the murderer should be executed by being shot by a firing squad in the river bottom nearby.

Crack Drive Off the Tee.
Golfers have their differences like other sportsmen. Up to the present the question as to the distance of a crack drive, off the tee, for example, remains unsettled. By dint of careful measurement, it is asserted that 200 yards is a very good drive, and that it is only the crack players who can cover the 250. Two hundred and fifty yards is, however, a very long distance, and just about twice as far as even the deffest of us can throw a cricket ball. One hundred and forty yards is the record distance for throwing a cricket ball. A competitor in the Olympic sports has thrown a javelin just over 211 feet. With a sling a stone has been thrown more than 300 yards.

Seemingly Immune to Fire.
A lady described as "the official medium of the London Psychological Society" has publicly demonstrated her powers of fire-handling, which she ascribes to being controlled in her trances by the spirit of a Parsee fire worshiper. Chabert, "the Fire King," who was a popular favorite in London close to a century ago, used to rub a red-hot shovel on his face and head, and allow anyone in the audience to step on the platform and drop molten sealing wax on his tongue and hands. He would take a raw leg of mutton into an oven heated to 220 degrees, remain inside until the joint was cooked, then carve it into slices which were distributed among the spectators.
