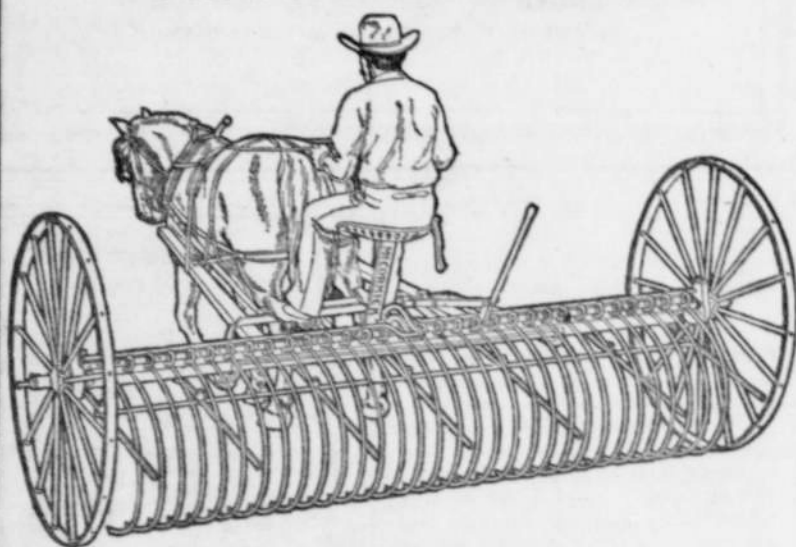

Toka Out Friday—

Urges Blight Treatment—

County Agent Miller is urging that the fruit growers of the county take every precaution possible to guard against the further spread of blight, which has appeared in a few orchards. The hard winter has made the trees more susceptible to the disease. A formula is given which may be used to combat the blight. Professor Reimer found in experiments that bichloride of mercury, 1 to 500 will not destroy pear blight bacteria on the wounds of the pear tree but it would destroy them on the metal tools used in the eradication work. It was found that cyanide of mercury in the same proportions would destroy the bacteria on

the wounds but had no effect on the tools. By making a mixture of one gram each of bichloride and cyanide of mercury to 500 parts water, a disinfectant effective for both uses was found.

Mrs. Caroline Swenon passed away the morning of June 6th, 1920, of abscess on the brain. She was the mother of 10 children, five sons and five daughters; seven of whom are living to mourn her loss. She was left a widow when the children were all quite young. The daughters are Mrs. L. F. Lowe, Mrs. G. A. Johnson, Miss Emma Swenon, of Portland, and Mrs. W. T. Barnes, of Murphy; the three sons are: Theo. Swenon, of New Mexico; Will Swenon, of North Dakota; and Alfred Swenon, of Fairbanks, Alaska.

Mrs. Swenon was a woman generous to a fault and one who when met with reverses always made good.

She died at Portland at the age of 91 years and 10 months. She visited her daughter at Murphy last year and stood the trip fine and was expected again this summer.
