TO STOP STEALING OF AUTOS

Drastic Measure Introduced in Congress by Representative Dyer—Impose Big Fine.

A fine of \$5,000 or five years in jail for automobile thieves is proposed in a bill introduced in congress by Representative Dyer of Missouri, to protect the 6,500,000 automobiles in the United States, now valued at \$7,800,000,000.

More than 22,272 cars were stolen in 1918 in 18 western cities, according to statistics furnished by the American Automobile association. Detroit led with 2,639 thefts, followed by Chicago with 2,611.

Ohio leads all states in the Union with 464,823 automobiles. New York is second with 436,923, and Pennsylvania third with 407,923.

FASTENING ANTI-SKID CHAIN

Long Hook on Inside and Strong, Small Padlock on Outside Will Hold It in Place.

A rather long hook on the inside chain and a small, sturdy padlock on the outside chain will fasten an anti-skid chain on the wheel so that there will be no danger of its coming loose in use and either winding around the brake drum or being lost on the road. Releasing the padlock will allow enough slack on the inside chain so that the long hook may be unfastened.

DRIVE OVER BROKEN STONES

Best Way Is to Take Short Run and Let Car Coast With Clutch Out—Tires Are Saved.

The best way to drive a car over a short stretch of broken stone is to take a short run at it—not too fast—and let the car coast over the stone with the clutch out. Thus the rear tires are relieved of driving strains and of the resulting tearing actions of sharp stones on the rubber. Of course, it is not always practicable to do this, but when it can be done it adds just a little more to the life of the tires.

AUTOMOBILE NEWS

Vacuum cleaners for automobiles, operated on their engines, have been invented.

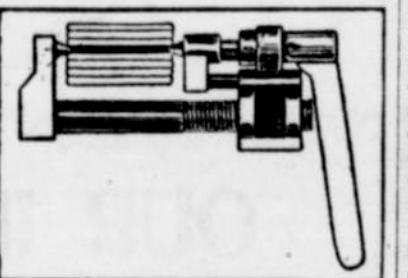
Sometimes compression cocks have a tendency to stick, making it hard to open them. Put a drop of oil in them occasionally, while engine is not running, and work it around to reach every part.

Never throw spark plugs haphazard into the tool box, where they may become cracked. Never throw an old plug away. Save the old ones and buy spare insulators or electrodes, and save money.

AVOID SQUEAKS IN SPRINGS

Device Shown in Illustration Spreads Leaves Equally on Both Sides for Greasing.

Squeaky springs are hard on the nerves. This device, obtainable at most accessory stores, spreads the leaves equally on both sides and enough so that grease may be spread evenly on them. When once adjusted to the

width of the springs, a single operation of the lever, which is rotatable and may be operated at any angle, spreads the leaves apart and locks itself in this position until by a further pull on the lever the spreader is released and immediately ready for the next insertion.

How Herons Take Fish.
The heron tribe has the most typical and accomplished spearmen, although the kingfishers and some others have ability of that sort. Persons who have been much near streams and lakes often have seen herons, and it is not difficult to watch them fish. With their long legs they easily can wade into fairly deep water. Having reached a suitable spot, they may stand for hours as motionless as a reed or post, with sharp-pointed spear—the long, slender beak—poised for a strike. If the fish is small the heron probably opens the beak slightly as he strikes, and snaps it up as if with forceps. It is known they sometimes drive the beak through large fish and it may be they often kill their prey in that way.

Giant Snail of Africa.
A valuable addition made recently to one of London's foremost zoos was a collection of giant snails, many of them measuring as much as eight inches. These snails came from East Africa, and had they remained longer they probably would have been eaten by the natives. Both the snail and its egg are considered delicacies in that off land. The egg is so large it is mistaken for a pigeon's egg.
