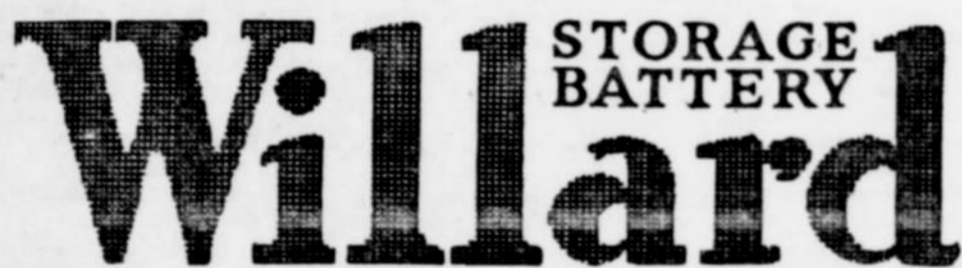

It's up to you to make your water right safe for your own use. Are you getting yours while you can?

Eugene Franklin Morrison, of Williams, to take .25 second foot of water from the east fork of Williams creek for irrigating 10 acres. A new dam and the enlargement of an existing ditch will cost \$200.

Herman Bros., of Selma, to take .13 second foot of water from Draper creek and Spring creek for irrigating 10 acres. A dam of brush and earth and a pumping plant, with main ditch, will cost \$250, work to be commenced before April 1, 1921.

H. L. Chapin of Wolf Creek, to take .95 second foot of water from Stage Gulch creek for irrigating 4

acres. The dam will be of earth, the main ditch will be one-fourth mile long, cost not given.

Same applicant, to take .1 second foot of water from Wolf Creek for the irrigation of 8 acres. A dam of brush and loose rock, with wasteway, and a ditch 770 feet long will be constructed, cost not given.

The Bolen Creek Mining Co., of Medford, June 3 filed in the office of the state engineer an application for permit to appropriate 10 second feet of water from Sucker creek, tributary to Illinois river, for developing power to be used in manufacturing lumber for mining purposes. Canals, pipe line, water wheel and six miles of flume will cost \$80,000; construction to be commenced by October 1.

W. M. Loban of Wolf Creek, filed in the office of Percy A. Cupper, state engineer June 9 application for permit to appropriate .1 second foot of water from an unnamed gulch tributary to Grave creek, for irrigation

purposes; details of construction not available.

David L. and Gertrude E. Webb, of Waldo, to take 1 second foot of water from Dwight creek, tributary to Elk creek, for the irrigation of 45 acres. A dam of earth and brush, earth headgate, half-mile ditch and canals will be constructed, cost not estimated.

Frank Randle of Jacksonville, for 16 second foot of water from gulch tributary to Little Applegate river, for irrigating 13 acres. A main ditch one mile long will be constructed at a cost of \$150, as soon as permit reached applicant.

George L. Allen, of Waldo, for .05 second foot of water from Cedar Gulch, tributary to east fork of Illinois river, for irrigating 4 acres. A dam of lumber, rock and earth, timber headgate and main ditch will cost \$35; work to begin June 5.

Ralph S. Bennett, R. F. D. 1, Grants Pass, for 2.6 second feet of water from Jump-off-Joe creek, tributary to Rogue river for mining purposes and irrigating 9 acres. A dam of earth and boards, wood headgate, main ditch and flumes will cost \$400, work to be started by Nov. 1.

N. L. Cassaday, for 13 second foot of water from Quartz creek, tributary to Rogue river, for the irrigation of 10 acres. A dam of logs and planking, hydraulic plant and 495 feet of pipe line will cost \$355, work to be started by March 1, 1921.

With the first removal of dirt by the contractors, a canal 33 miles in length to the district, taking its waters from Little Butte creek supplemented by storage in Fish and Four Mile lakes, will be begun which will irrigate 10,000 acres in the Medford Irrigation district.

High Cost of Entertaining.
Compensation voted the lord mayor of London is not a salary in reality, it is merely an allowance in aid of entertainment, the Manchester Guardian explains. Lord mayors often spend double the amount allowed them. In the case of ambassadors, the entertainment bills are much higher than those of the lord mayors. It is up to every ambassador to see that he is not outshone in this respect by any other embassy. When Lord Granville was sent to the coronation of Czar Alexander he received an entertainment fund of about \$50,000—and he spent more.

New York and Other Seaports.

As a result of the great war the population of France has decreased 7 per cent, but the population of some of the large cities of France has made a large increase. Lyons, Bordeaux and Marseilles are of special interest to American investors, who have paid many millions of dollars in purchasing bonds issued by these cities. Their gain in population has ranged from 15 to 36 per cent, the largest being that of Marseilles, and it is perhaps significant that Marseilles is the principal port of France on the Mediterranean, remarks the Boston Commercial Bulletin.

As the great seaport of America, New York has made enormous growth in recent years and the population has become so great that not only is New York the largest city in the world but English newspapers now admit that New York has nearly a million more inhabitants than London, which has been for over a century the world's greatest city.

Rare Plants in Demand.

In 1803 a scientific man named Drummond discovered one solitary aronia plant in the woods of St. Tammany parish in Louisiana, and it is cherished today at the Arnold arboretum. Now Harvard has written to New Orleans asking to have Louisiana searched again for the rare growth, and the New Orleans Garden society has offered a prize of \$5 for the discovery of another aronia plant. Harvard also wants Louisiana searched for a certain variety of ash, discovered near New Orleans about a century ago and never seen before or since.

United States Forests.

About one-fourth of the United States, or 550,000,000 acres, is in forests. Forests publicly owned contain about one-fifth of all the timber standing. The remaining four-fifths is privately owned. The original forests of the country covered an area of 850,000,000 acres, and contained a greater quantity and variety of timber than on any area of similar size in the world. The present rate of cutting for all purposes exceeds the annual growth of the forests.
