KRUPP WORKER IS UNITED STATES HERO

Quit Germany and Came to America During War—Has 12 Medals.

Louis M. Van Iersel, a native of Holland, who is recognized as one of the bravest and most decorated men in the American Expeditionary forces, served as a laborer in the Krupp gun works at Essen, Germany, during the early days of the war. He recently applied to the United States government for citizenship papers.

Van Iersel wears 12 medals, among them the congressional medal of honor, and the medaille militaire of France. Both medals are the highest honor that either France or the United States can bestow.

When the war began to affect Germany's man power, neutrals were welcomed across the border. Iersel left his home in Dussen, Holland, to work in the shipping department of the Krupp gun works. He soon tired of Germany and escaped to England, where he shipped on the steamship Little Secret, bound for the United States.

When he reached New York, he enlisted in the United States army, all his fighting blood having been aroused when the ship on which he was coming to the United States passed through the wreckage of a victim of a German submarine.

His discharge papers trace him in action in the American army through the Troyon sector, the Alsne defensive, Chateau Thierry, the Marbach sector, St. Mihiel, Soissons, Meuse-Argonne and Champagne.

It was the battle of Soissons that the first war medal came to him, a croix de guerre with silver stars. At St. Mihiel, Van Iersel added a palm to his croix de guerre. Out of 50 men who held back a whole German battalion, he was one of the three survivors. Later he captured, single handed, a machine gun crew of 5 officers and 60 men.

INCOME FROM TOBACCO

Internal Revenue and Customs Receipts \$178,000,000 in 1918.

The internal revenue from tobacco has always been much larger than the customs receipts, says the United States department of agriculture. In the first year's operation of the law, 1882, the internal revenue was \$3,000,000, in the next year, \$9,000,000, and the amount increased to \$31,000,000 by 1870, \$41,000,000 by 1877, and \$47,000,000 by 1882. After that year the amount declined and remained relatively low until 1898, with a low-water mark of \$26,000,000 in 1884.

Suddenly, in 1890, the income jumped to \$52,000,000, and the amount reached \$71,000,000 in 1912, \$85,000,000 in 1916, \$102,000,000 in 1917, and \$156,000,000 in 1918. The receipts of internal revenue and customs together produced \$13,000,000 in 1865; \$52,000,000 in 1897; \$75,000,000 in 1909; \$104,000,000 in 1913; \$132,000,000 in 1917, and \$178,000,000 in 1918.

High Speed Steel Without Tungsten.

A new high speed steel of British origin is without tungsten in its composition and advantages of both a practical and economical nature are claimed. It is cobalt-molybdenum steel, the cobalt apparently acting as a stabilizer and as correcting certain disadvantages said to exist in molybdenum-tungsten steels. The new steel is claimed to possess the highest point of efficiency ever obtained. The hardening temperature required is only in the neighborhood of 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit. The steel is also reported to machine exceptionally soft and easily. The specific gravity of como steel is reported to be equal to that of the old carbon tool steel, and so 10 per cent less than that of the tungsten high-speed steels. As a result it is estimated that a given weight of como steel will produce 10 per cent more tools than the same weight of regular high-speed steel.

Industrial Research.

Again and again during the war it was insisted by all manner of authorities in England that one of the great efforts of the future should be in the direction of encouraging industrial research. This was, in fact, a war lesson, and Great Britain evidently has no intention of losing it. Already a government department of "scientific and industrial research" has been established; while, according to the chairman at a recent meeting of the Institution of Electric Engineers, "universities all over the country, led by University college, London, are re-equipping their training departments."
