

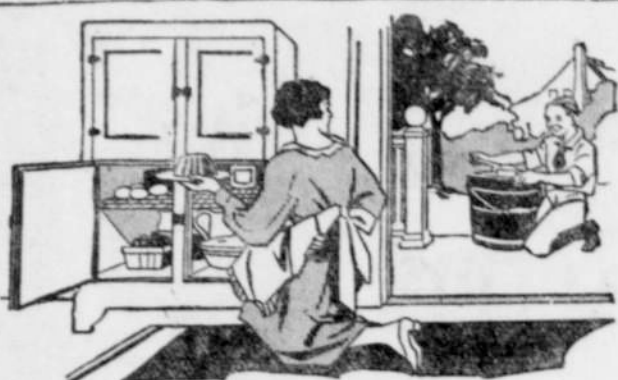

Not Among Passengers—

For 20 years A. C. Stewart, a mining man of this city, never missed being among the passengers on the first steamer to push her way through the ice to Nome in the spring. A Seattle paper carried the announcement last week of the steamer Victoria forcing her way to within two miles of the Alaskan city and landing her passengers on the ice. Commenting on the number of Alaskan people who have located here Mr. Stewart said "I guess it must be the climate. Here I am eating strawberries at the same time the people are landing on the ice in Alaska." Mr. Stewart is a strong booster for the Southern Oregon climate.

Bids for Irrigation Project—

The board of directors of the Grants Pass Irrigation project is advertising in Southern Oregon and Portland papers for bids for the building of the concrete dam and the canals to be constructed from the proceeds of the bond issue authorized by the voters last Saturday. The plans and specifications for the structures and the excavation can be seen at the office of the district in the courthouse, and bids can be submitted for all or a part of the work. As the bids will be considered next Saturday, contractors must get their data without delay, as it is expected that the dam will be built during the low stage of water in the Rogue.
