TREATING PIGS FOR WORMS

Sanitary Cement Wallow Should Be Provided and Oil or Dip Added to Kill Vermin.

Before starting spring pigs on summer feed, the entire lot should be treated for worms unless the owner is certain that the premises are clear.

Hogs should have a sanitary cement or frame wallow. Into the water should be put some crude oil or a dip to destroy lice, keep the skin in good condition, and promote gains.

A maximum use of pasture is desirable. If present pastures are poor or insufficient they may be supplemented with rape. A good rape pasture should carry 20 pigs to the acre for the season, according to R. O. Ashby of the Minnesota station.

Wherever pigs are given a full feed of grain the self-feeder should be used to save labor. Corn should be supplemented with a feed rich in protein.

The hogs should hog-off enough corn to finish them for the market, unless they are to be put behind cattle.

SHEEP AS SOURCE OF PROFIT

Close-Grazing Animals Will Thrive on Short Grass and Rough Land—Worthy of Trial.

Sheep would be a source of profit on many farms where they have not been given attention. They are close-grazing animals and as such will thrive on short grass and rough land where other animals would find it difficult to live.

EARLY PIGS REQUIRE GRAIN

Young Animals Cannot Be Expected to Get Heavy Enough for Market From Cornfield.

Pigs fattened in late April, May and June can be fed on the same general plan but cannot be expected to get heavy enough to be marketed to the best advantage from the cornfield, but will require grain feeding up to late December or January at least before they will be heavy enough.

GERMANY'S PLOT IN U. S. BARED

Von Papen Admits Everything in Berlin Inquiry.

FIRST TIME MADE PUBLIC

Worked to Restrict American Deliveries of War Materials to Entente in 1915—Chief of Staff Believed if This Could Be Accomplished Germany Would Win War—Von Papen Says Officials Were Unneutral.

"If you succeed in measurably restricting American deliveries of war materials to the entente until the end of 1915, we will in all probability have won the war."

Gen. von Falkenhayn, then chief of the German general staff, wrote this to Capt. Franz von Papen, German military attaché at Washington, in the spring of that year. The statement, which comprises part of the evidence submitted by Von Papen in a recent hearing before a parliamentary commission in Berlin, was amplified by him to the extent that he directed his efforts to this end.

First Time Made Public.

Capt. von Papen at the time was secretly examined by the national assembly commission, which also heard Count von Bernstorff, the former German ambassador to the United States; his evidence is only now made public.

Von Papen declared that he was of the same opinion politically as Von Bernstorff with respect to the American situation, and so informed Gen. von Falkenhayn when he returned after his recall from Washington.

"If you do not succeed in keeping the United States out of the entente coalition, you will have lost the war," Von Papen informed the chief of staff. He added that tremendous material and moral assets were at the disposal of America.

"But," continued Von Papen, "these were so imperfectly appraised here I deemed it necessary to enlighten German public opinion concerning them."

The military attaché obtained the consent of Von Jagow, foreign secretary, to appear before the German editors for the purpose of informing them on the German attitude, but Major Nicoll, chief of the press and espionage division of the general staff, opposed the plan.

After detailing the plans to secure a corner in war materials in the United States, control of factories, divert labor, and prevent munitions from reaching the entente, Von Papen said that the theft of Doctor Albert's portfolio containing the outlines of the scheme brought the secret to the entente's possession.

Criticizes Government.

In the course of further evidence, Von Papen touched upon the alleged unneutral attitude of official quarters in Washington, the American courts and political circles, and declared that the British military attaché was permitted to operate unmolested and given the support of official quarters and the American secret service.

"General Wood once asked me to call on him at Governor's Island," Von Papen testified. "He was very cordial and smilingly told me: 'Several persons have called on me and given me a detailed plan of the plot which you, captain, are supposed to have worked out. The scheme provides for the landing of German U-boats at New York, which would then proceed to blow up the subway tunnels and the city's water mains. We have your complete plans; where you propose to place your explosives and what points you will attack. Complete evidence is in my possession. You may see it if you are interested.'"

"We did not waste a single word over the matter. But the incident shows the methods used against us at the time."

DIALECT WON ADMITTANCE

Southern Negro Regains Citizenship Rights Through His Speech.

The real American southern dialect as used by Peter Snow, a negro, who sought admittance at Ellis Island to the United States as a citizen, was deemed sufficient to substantiate his claim of citizenship, and he was passed by the immigration officials.

Snow had no papers to prove that he was a citizen of Georgia, as he claimed, but the narration of his roamings in Africa won his case. He declared that "sometime about 1895" he had shipped as a cook aboard a ship which carried negroes back to Africa.

He spent 24 years wandering about in the land of black strangers and penetrated into some of the "darkest corners of Africa."

Atmosphere Ends at 350 Miles Upward

The limit of atmosphere is 350 miles above the earth, or 150 times the height of Mount Whitney, successful experiments of the famous Norwegian astronomer, Stormer, have shown.

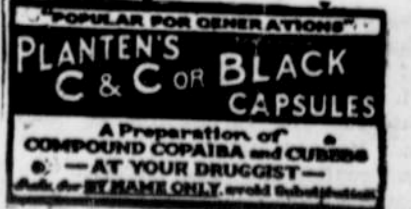
