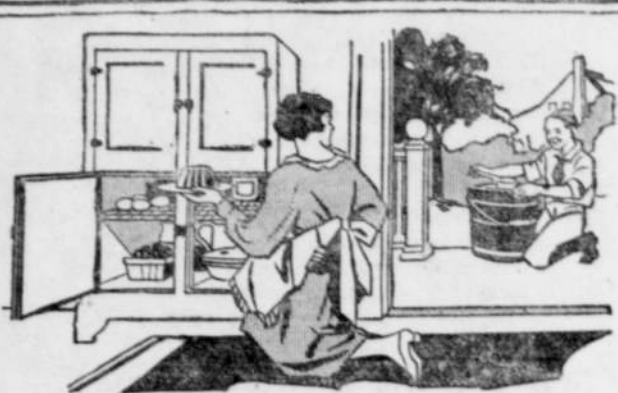

ALBANIA FIRST IN FIELD

"Dairy Lunch" Well Known in That Country Long Before It Was Introduced Here.

Long before the dairy lunch or the cafeteria, those well-known American institutions into which the American business man dashes wildly at noon hour and helps himself from a tempting array of eats, burst upon the great republic, Albania had them.

The "pick 'em yourself" places may have been a novelty in the United States ten or fifteen years ago, but even then they were an old institution in Albania.

The carefully scrubbed marble top of the American dairy lunch, resting on a long table of marble front and sides, is replaced in the Albanian one by a dainty piece of rock about six feet long, three feet wide and four feet deep, resting on a bulky bit of timber, which, in turn, is supported by wooden legs just as bulky.

The whole is as rugged as the mountains from which it all came. In the stone, somewhere back in the past, circularlike excavations were produced at regular intervals. In the bottom of these a hot charcoal fire smolders over which slowly cook the chicken, the turkey, the potatoes or the rice. At one end of the rock are the knives, forks and plates.

Concerning War Risk Insurance—

Reinstatement of war risk insurance. Regardless of how long it may have been lapsed or cancelled, and regardless of how long the former service man may have been discharged, war risk insurance may be reinstated any time before July 1, 1920. The only conditions are: 1—Two monthly premiums on the amount of insurance to be reinstated must accompany the application. 2—The applicant must be in as good health as at the date of discharge or at the expiration of the grace period, whichever ever is the later date, and so state in the application. The home service section of the Red Cross has necessary blanks for such applications and the secretary, Mrs. Moss, is ready at any time to assist in making the applications. 08

Electric Ovens.
Electric heat finds its widest use in ovens, which have proved specially valuable in the automobile industry for baking the Japan on car bodies. By this means Japan is baked on 3,000 bodies every day. Other large users of such ovens are telephone and typewriter factories, foundries, makers of iron frames for beds and cots and manufacturers of chemicals. Electric devices of the sort are employed for baking effervescent salts, and for drying a large variety of products requiring well-regulated heat and clean air in the oven itself.
