Smoke Recorder on Chimney.

A new application of the metal selenium, suggested by a French scientist, L. Ance, is to use the selenium cells as smoke recorders in chimneys. A selenium cell is mounted on one side of a chimney or flue; on the opposite side is fixed a lamp. The amount of light falling upon the selenium and hence the resistance of the cell will depend upon the density of the smoke in the flue; the fire can, therefore, be controlled by the galvanometer records.
