Procession of all kinds are to be found in the streets of Stamboul, and with no traffic regulations it is difficult to make much headway. In "The Daily Pageant of Stamboul" in the Travel Magazine Miss Lucy Garnett finds herself in mixed society. "In company with a large drove of turkeys, we take our way along the broad straight street, lined on either hand with shops. Presently the turkeys get into difficulties with a file of animals bearing on their Atlas-like shoulders piles of bedding and curiously decorated chests and coffers. These bales and chests constitute the wedding trousseau and 'plenishing' of a Turkish bride." The turkeys are soon remounted to be dispersed many times before they are finally landed safely near the great mosque where they are to be sold in celebration of a Moslem festival.

**World's Highest Village.**

The little village of Karzok in Kashmir is said by a writer in L'Astronomie to be the highest in the world. Its altitude is 14,946 feet. The buildings consist of a few wretched stone houses and a small Buddhist monastery. Kashmir is the most northerly state of India and lies wholly in the Himalaya mountains. Not far from its eastern border is Mt. Everest, the loftiest peak, so far as known in the world.

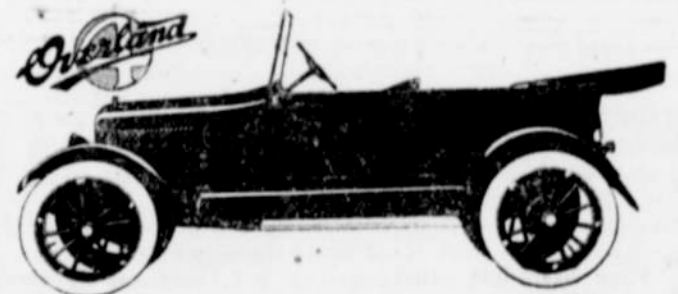

It is said that the Chinese were the first bread makers, and they made bread from wheat and rice as early as 1908 B. C. Probably the first bread made from yeast was baked in England in about 1634. Aerated bread, which rises from carbonic acid gas injected into the dough, became somewhat common in 1857, but practically all bread, bakery-made or home-made, owes its leavening to yeast or baking powder.
