Must Eradicate Blight—

The blight situation in a number of orchards in the valley is said to be becoming serious and precautions sufficient to care for it, are not being taken. The county agent calls attention to the fact that the infected parts must be cut out and burned. This is provided by state law and, if the law is not observed, action will be taken to prevent the spread to other orchards. Another disease which is showing up is anthracnose, which appears to be something like blight but it affects only the twig. After cutting out blight both the tree and tools should be thoroughly disinfected.

BRITISH CONSUL ON WAY HERE FOR FISHING

Mr. MacNeill owns a beautiful tract of land on the North side of the Rogue, just below Savage rapids where he proposes to build a fishing lodge as soon as the building situation is relieved. He has been a visitor to Grants Pass now each fishing season for five years.

Nathan Merritt, known as the "Hermit," because of the fact that he has lived alone in a cabin on Louse creek for years, died this morning at the hospital. He was brought in Thursday suffering with a stroke of paralysis, and as he was 88 years of age he was unable to recover. GASOLINE SHORTAGE AGAIN HITS THIS CITY

The gasoline situation in the city has not a very rosy appearance today and dealers are rationing out the liquid to the users. Only two gallons are allowed to each car and the owners are cautioned not to do much joy-riding. Although the local automotive association has brought in several cars of gasoline and have

more ordered, there are no immediate prospects of having all the gas that can be used. According to C. D. Fies, the local manager of the Standard Oil company, it will be November before the shortage is overcome. The local dealers do not expect their next car for 10 days. A train of 25 cars of gasoline for Oregon has been ordered from Texas and this will be distributed throughout the state. If it is used as it usually is, even this will not make a very great impression on the situation.
