OUR GAME AND FISH ASSET

It is well to be known in the spirit of delight.

Oregon may justly boast of many achievements and attractions. The height and grandeur of her moun-

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tains, the density and impressive solitude of her forests, the broad expanse of her seemingly interminable wheat fields, her miasms, her bonanza cattle ranches, her deep rolling rivers and plunging cataracts, her thriving towns and cities, the independence, upstanding probity and enterprise of her citizens—all these are talents which Oregon can display with pride in the unfolding of her napkin.

The people of Oregon invite attention to each desirable characteristic of the state. We have opportunity here for the creation of wealth that is full of promise to him who will come in and labor with us in the process of creation. We say to the outsider come in and see, and if you are satisfied with what you find sit down with us and partake.

We have scenery that charms and climate that is an assurance of good health; and again we say to the out-

sider you have only to visit and to live in Oregon for a little time to be convinced of the truth of each of these statements.

We might remember, however, in seeking to present attractively the advantages of Oregon that among our assets that which contributes most to the delight of the visitor or the sojourner within our borders is the one to be kept in the foreground when we have determined which it is.

The wild life of Oregon is so varied and abundant that it offers the best of sport to him who loves the game of the great out of doors. Whether he seeks birds or bear, or deer, or mountain cats the huntsman will find in Oregon a field that will contribute to his gratification and delight in a manner not to be excelled in any other part of the United States; while for the fisherman—the real fisherman—the man who is keen for piscatorial sport with a thrill in it, there is recreation in Oregon streams, the like of which cannot be found elsewhere in the country.

We do not emphasize these attractions as much as we might, as frequently and as forcibly as we should. And because of them and the value of them it behooves the people of Oregon to conserve the wild life and the game fish of the state that this proffer of delight to fishermen and huntsmen from all sections of the United States may be permanently maintained and more generally known and accepted than it now is.

It is worth traveling across the continent to enjoy such hunting and fishing as may be had in the state of Oregon, but unless that fact is known we lose the value of this attraction. Whenever it is known as a matter of experience, Oregon wins a new and a fast friend through the sensation of sheer delight.

The moral is obvious. It is well to be known in the spirit of delight.
