PROPOSAL TO USE DIRECT ACTION AGAINST BRITISH

London, July 13.—A proposal to employ direct action if necessary to force the government to withdraw its troops from Ireland and cease manufacturing munitions for use in Ireland and Russia was defeated today in a special trades union congress called to consider labor's attitude on the Irish question.

Trieste, July 13.—An American officer is reported to have been killed in recent street fighting between the Croats and Italians, during the Jugoslav nationalist demonstration at Spalato, Dalmatia.

Irrigation District Extended—

Many land owners who were not included within the boundaries of the Grants Pass Irrigation district at the time of the establishment of the district, or with later inclusions, are now making petition for inclusion. Tracts in the lower valley that had not previously been included, are now being taken in, and numerous petitions are now on file with the board of directors. The plan for the immediate completion of the gravity project, with its release from the charges for power, is reason for this desire upon the part of the land owners to have their lands within the project.

Examination Held July 24.—

The U. S. Civil Service commission announces that a clerk-carrier examination will be held on July 24, 1920, to establish an eligible register from which selections may be made to fill vacancies as they may occur in the positions of clerk and carrier, post-office service, Grants Pass. Salary, \$1000 per annum, plus bonus. All citizens of the United States who meet the requirements, both men and women, may enter this examination; appointing officers, however, have the legal right to specify the sex desired in requesting certification of eligibles. Age limits, 18 to 45 years on the date of the examination. Age limits do not apply to persons entitled to preference on account of military or naval service. For further information and application blank apply to Arthur L. White, local secretary, board of civil service examiners, Grants Pass, or to the secretary, 11th U. S. Civil Service district, 203 postoffice building, Seattle, Wash.
