To Irrigate Jerome Prairie—

A meeting of the land owners of the Jerome Prairie country is to be held Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock, at the Jerome Prairie school house,

for the consideration of plans for joining with the Grants Pass Irrigation district and the watering of the lands of the prairie from the project. The district project has been planned to include Jerome Prairie, and now that actual work is underway, it will be necessary that the lands be included at once that the highline canal may be made sufficiently large to include the needed water. The plan for the watering of the prairie is for the pumping from the highline canal into the canals to serve the prairie, about 1200 acres to be covered. At the meeting tomorrow night the district engineers will explain the plan in detail, with the estimates of cost for construction and for maintenance.
