The chamber of commerce and
public spirited individuals have pro-
vided rubber "It's the Climate"
stamps and distributed them gratis
to the various business houses of the
city. And yet, according to reports
from some firms receiving a lot of
local mail, there are but very few
business houses making it a practice
to have their outgoing mail stamped
with the climate stamp which they
have for that purpose.

When a piece of mail is received
from a local firm without the "It's
the Climate" stamp on the envelope,
the recipient should consider it a
duty to call up the sender and sug-
gest that the little rubber stamp be
used more freely. If everyone would
do this, Grants Pass and Josephine
County would receive a great deal

more attention and advertising than
at present.

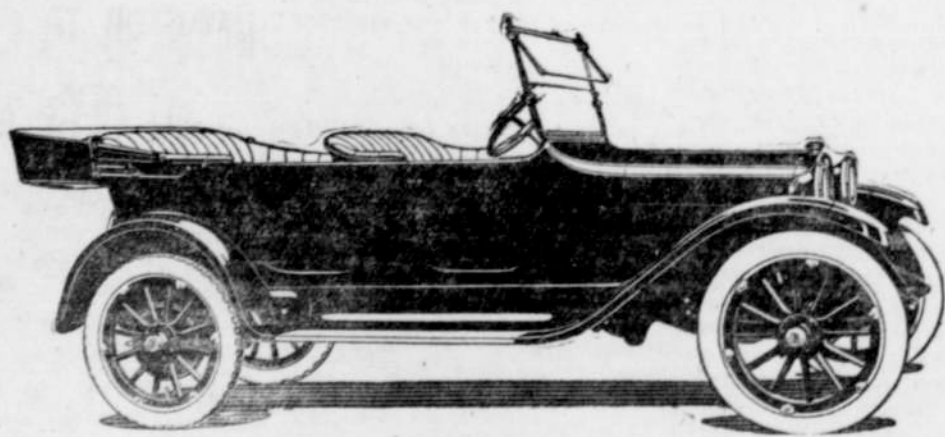

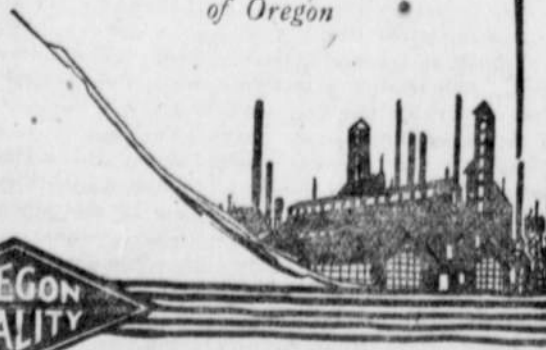
