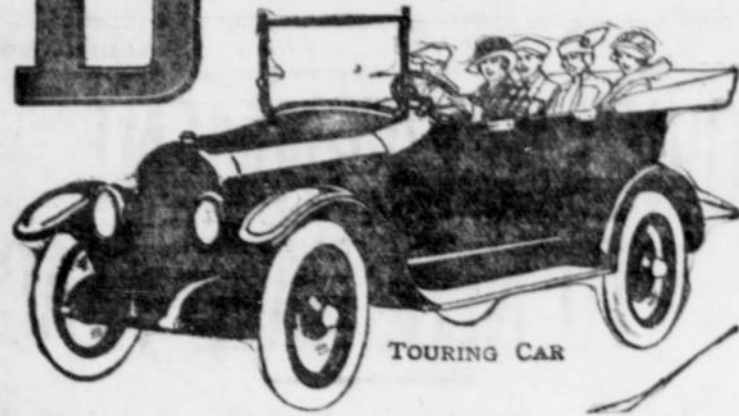

ZULUS SHOW ESTEEM FOR AFRICAN LEADER

Durban, South Africa, July 24.—The chief of the Zulu nation, his ringed headmen and many minor chiefs, recently assembled in the courthouse at Maritburg and delivered speeches of affection and esteem for Lord Sidney Charles Buxton, retiring governor-general of South Africa, and Lady Buxton, who accompanied him on the farewell visit. There was an enthusiastic demonstration.

The courthouse was packed with the courtly, dignified Zulus, some of them in frock coats and wearing medals received for bravery in the war, but others, also wearing medals won on European battlefields, were clad only in the primitive Zulu fashion.

Chief Manzolwandhli, son of Cete-wayo, as a chief of the Royal Zulu blood voiced his thanks for "the beneficent British rule." Then Chief Mini spoke. He said:

"The Zulus gave assistance in the great war and if assistance is needed again they are prepared to die for their King and country."

The governor-general thanked the Zulus for their excellent behavior during the war, and for their active assistance. As he finished speaking the "bayete" salute rang out, anthem-like in a final farewell.

BARON SAYS FATE OF GERMANY WITH ALLIES

Berlin, July 24.—All hopes of American credits must definitely be abandoned as a result of the outcome of the reichstag elections and the fate of Germany consequently will be completely in the hands of the entente, according to Baron von Richthofen, defeated democratic candidate, who outlines his views in a long article in the Boersen Zeitung.

Americans were not unfavorably disposed toward Germany's political and economic future, Baron Richthofen continues, but the defeat of the democratic program at the elections dissipated many fond hopes based on that fact.

"We must expect Americans will demand priority for any of their credits over the allies indemnity claims, which means the final decision will lie with the entente," he believes.

CAMBRIDGE GRADUATE IS JERUSALEM HEAD

Jerusalem, July 24.—The office of governor of Jerusalem once occupied by Pontius Pilate, is now held by Colonel Ronald Storrs, a graduate of Cambridge university and son of the Dean of Rochester college, England.

His task is one to test the administrative ability of any man. Jerusalem is a city of disunions, where, whatever may come of the future, for the moment Zionists and Arabs are passionately divided and to steer a just path between them and induce them to join him on that path is thankless work.

It is to that task however, that he chiefly devotes himself. Twice a week he has meetings of his favorite pro-Jerusalem society, where French Italians, British, Americans, rabbis, Zionists, leaders, commercial men of standing and others who are in any way prominent in the life of the city are brought together and in the course of debate, led to see that they have in common a single citizenship. His motto as governor is "unify and be friends."

Colonel Storrs was one of the prime movers in the establishment of an independent Arab kingdom. He is 38 years old.
