

SINN FEIN COURTS IN IRELAND BROADENED

Dublin, July 31.—The Sinn Fein courts in Ireland continue to extend the area and nature of their operations. Among the cases lately tried have been cases of libel and slander, of judicial separation of the unhappily married and of seduction. These were on the civil side. On the criminal side all sorts of offenses are tried. As a rule the persons charged think it safer to turn up and take their chance of punishment. But in most cases they do not get any option in the matter. In a recent case in County Clare the person charged was a local magistrate, accused of trespass. He ignored the summons and refused to recognize the jurisdiction of the Sinn Fein court. The volunteers captured him and carried him off to an unknown destination and the military are now guarding his house.

The Sligo asylum committee is a real radical on Sinn Fein. It has just decided that the Sinn Fein flag shall be permanently flown over the asylum. They have vested in the Irish volunteers the task of conveying lunatics to the institution, and left the power of committing lunatics to the Sinn Fein arbitration assisted by a local doctor.

Kerry county council has decided to refuse to insert advertisements in the local papers unless they agree to publish reports in the Irish language of the council's proceedings.

Curious Pottery.

The use of dried fruits of trees, such as the gourd and the coconut for holding water and liquid substances is familiar, but it is not so generally known that cups, saucers and jars to take the place of ordinary earthenware are made in the Orient of a glutinous and plastic material entirely of vegetable origin, which is easily moulded and dried.

Chinese Decorate Roof Ridge.

The roof ridge of a Chinese house is usually decorated with an elaborate plaster ornament in the form of a design, embodying the character "fu," signifying happiness. To prevent the ornament being damaged by birds the owner of the house sticks numerous ordinary sewing needles point outward into the soft plaster.

LUMBER COMPANY IS CHARGED WITH FRAUD

In answer to the assurances given yesterday by C. W. Nibley, president of the Grande Ronde Lumber company to the effect that he had no part or knowledge of the alleged fraudulent practices charged by the government against the lumber company in obtaining title to more than 24,000 acres of timber land in Eastern Oregon, this morning Assistant U. S. Attorney John Veatch declared that not only Nibley's son, Alexander Nibley, and the son's wife, but also his partner, Frank S. Murphy, and Mr. Murphy's wife filed claims and proved titles which were immediately turned over to the lumber company.

These titles were proved February 21, 1902, and transferred to the lumber company nine days later, the government attorney stated. Mr. Nibley and Mr. Murphy, both of Salt Lake City, bought into the company February 9, 1902, the record shows. —Portland Telegram.

CATTLE SHRINK IN TRANSIT

Owner Loses Considerable by Not Taking Proper Precautions in Shipping Live Stock.

Investigations by the Colorado agricultural college are beginning to show that shrinkage of live stock when shipped to market can be greatly reduced. The most important thing is a comfortable car and not much crowding. The next thing is to have the animals well fed and contented when they are loaded and until they are sold at the terminal market. In other words, plenty of feed and water and comfortable quarters are most important.

"Some farmers," says R. W. Clark, live stock specialist for that institution, "ship regularly with little or no shrinkage, while others at all times have enormous shrinkage."

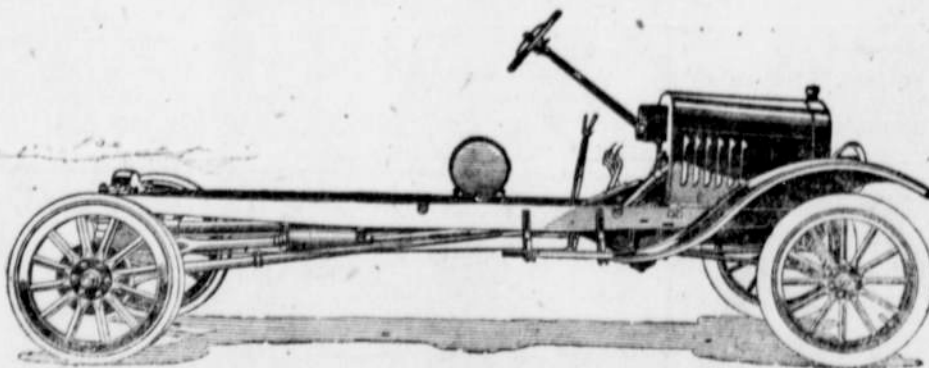
