Commercial Fishing Poor at Mouth—

The exceptional warmth of the water in Rogue river this year is keeping the fish from entering the river at Gold Beach, according to Clark Bardon, the local fisherman, who has just returned from the mouth of the river. He also says there need be no fear of depletion of the fish in the river if the law is strictly enforced in the lower river, but that the difficulty is in enforcement, although a real attempt is being made. Many thousands of steelheads are reported lying in the river at the mouth of cold streams, but refusing to come up Rogue river on account of the warmth. As soon as the stream cools one of the greatest runs of small steelheads and salmon ever experienced may be looked for according to old timers on the river. Bardon has been at Gold Beach since June, returning by the trail and by West Fork.

Murphy Party Returns From Tour—

A party of Murphy people, including Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Mitchell, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Leith, Mrs. Mary Gilmore and Mrs. Mary Leith of Grants Pass, returned this morning from an extended tour through the middle west. Inter-Urban Line Here—

The inter-urban stage service which has been conducted between Ashland and Medford in the past, has established a scheduled service between Grants Pass and Medford, beginning today. The regular inter-urban autos are on the line, and will make four trips each way every day.

Medford Estimates Fruit Crop—

Estimates of the 1920 fruit crop in the Medford district of the Rogue river valley have been made public, the estimate being placed at 1200 cars. Of this total it is expected there will be 700 cars of pears and 500 cars of apples. An effort is already being made to register help for the picking season, as the lack of labor for this purpose was a menace last year, and shows little tendency to improve this year. The crop in the Grants Pass district is now being estimated, but can not be made public for some time yet.
