Reports from all parts of the Rogue river valley are to the effect that the season is exceptionally dry. Throughout the Applegate valley the farmers are having a hard time to get enough water for proper irrigation. Ashland is being forced to dole out the water for lawn watering purposes with more rigid rules than ever before, as Ashland creek is reduced to the lowest stage in many years. The recent rain seems to have done Grants Pass more good than other sections, records here giving .22 of an inch, while Medford got less than .1 inch.
