To the regret of a large congregation at the Presbyterian church yesterday Rev. L. Myron Boozer announced he had accepted the recent call to take charge of Presbyterian work at O. A. C., and wishes to leave September 1st. At a meeting next Sunday the church will act upon the resignation. Rev. Boozer has been pastor of the Presbyterian church the past two years coming here from Grants Pass. Twenty-four years in the ministry Rev. Boozer has made an enviable record both as an eloquent and forceful speaker and as a parish worker and his departure is not only regarded as a great loss to the church but to the community at large. In addition to his church work, Mr. Boozer has always taken

an active part in all civic movements of a worthy nature. In his announcement Rev. Boozer explained that he left Medford with genuine regret but that he felt the call from the Presbyterian synod was one he could not well refuse.—Mail Tribune.
