The Medford Mail-Tribune and the Ashland Tidings, both daily papers, have announced that they will increase the rates for subscriptions to the papers after September 1st. The Mail-Tribune together with the Sunday Sun, will now be \$8.50 by carrier and \$7.50 by mail. The Tidings will be \$7.50 after the first on carrier routes and \$6.50 by mail outside the city. The rise in rates was necessitated by the rapid rise in the newspaper and labor. Newsprint, which a few years ago could be bought for \$3.00 per hundred has now advanced to \$42.50 and on the first of September will go up to \$15.
