Potatoes Have Big Yield— J. F. Webster brought some potatoes into town today to show what irrigation would do to the valley. He had a basket almost half filled with the potatoes taken from one hill on the Webster ranch a mile west of the city. He had 10 pounds of exceptionally clean potatoes taken from one hill. Out of three hills he took 83 potatoes. They had not yet finished their growth. He has a small plot 30 by 90 feet planted to potatoes and estimates that he will harvest about 1500 pounds from the place. They were all grown in sandy soil but had plenty of water.

A telegram received this morning by Judge C. G. Gillette from state democratic headquarters brings word that Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic nominee for vice president, will not speak here tomorrow as planned. It had been planned that Mr. Roosevelt should talk from the train, but a stop of five minutes was the most that could be arranged for here. Mr. Roosevelt will speak in Roseburg and Ashland. The telegram reads as follows: "Unable to stop train 53 longer than five minutes. If you want to hear Mr. Roosevelt speak, go to Roseburg or Ashland. Can have him make his appearance on the rear platform at Grants Pass."

Elk Officers Here—

Officers and members of the Elks lodge are here today from Medford conducting the funeral services of H. L. Truax. Interment was made at the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Navy Recruiter Here—

Chief Quartermaster Ralph Carr, of the recruiting service for the United States navy, was in the city yesterday making arrangements for regular visits here. Mr. Carr has been given all the territory south of Eugene and has eight cities to cover each month. He is now mapping out a schedule which he can follow. Beginning on September 1, he will make regular visits to Grants Pass. Boys of 17 years of age may join the navy now according to Mr. Carr. They must join for three years or the rest of their minority. Boys with one year or more of high school may go direct to the radio or electrician school. Any ex-service man may enlist for submarine service, which pays \$5 a month more and \$1 per dive for not more than 15 dives a month. The local postmaster will furnish any additional information.

Old Guns Found—

When D. A. Jones, a local taxi driver, was at Jacksonville yesterday he had a very interesting experience. He had been at the Jacksonville cemetery and was just leaving when he saw about six inches of a gun sticking out from beneath the pine needles and brush covering the ground. He investigated and found two rifles, one an old needle gun and the other a 38-40 Winchester. A belt and a knife were also with the guns. He notified the sheriff who took possession of the guns. It is not known how the guns came to be where they were.

Trucks Grow in Favor.

There were 963,063 trucks in use at the end of the year 1919, as compared with approximately 700,000 for the preceding year. This is a gain of 27 per cent, 16 per cent greater than the increase shown by passenger cars. Only eighteen states make compilations of truck registration. New York leads with others following in this order: Illinois, Ohio, Pennsylvania, California, Iowa and Texas. Nevada with 700 is at the foot of the list.
