PRESERVE LOCAL HISTORY

Before the art of writing had been introduced on the American continent, historical facts were recorded only in the mind, and the American Indians through their folk-lore perpetuated the story of their existence. From a standpoint of entertainment for the Indian youngster that method was as good as any other, accuracy played no part. But today's standard demands something better, accuracy is now the keynote.

At the same time, the pioneers of our age, the age of the white man's occupation of Southern Oregon, are rapidly passing from this earth and as yet the only record we have of their deeds and adventures in making this territory a part of the United States is a record little better than the records of the Rogue River Indians who lived here before us.

There are yet a number of the real pioneers, the men and women who first entered this valley to make it a homeland for Yankee emigrants, and some concerted action should be taken by the community to put the history they have in their minds on record. The time will come when the lore and history of this section will be rich material sought by newcomers to whom the history of 1870 will seem like the adventures of Daniel Boone sounded to us in our youth. They will demand it, but will they get it straight and unadulterated? After the original source has departed there will be many a controversy over what came from that source, unless it is placed on record irrevocably.

This community should make a step toward compiling a local history, and what would be still better, but is more remote, all Southern Oregon should unite in having compiled from authentic sources, the history of the Rogue river valley.

Praise for High-Heeled Shoes.

Women's high-heeled shoes, regarded by medical science for years as production of nervous troubles, paralysis and other ills, have at last come in for professional commendation. That high-heeled shoes may be regarded as a preventive of consumption was the declaration of Doctor Gaultier before the Academy of Sciences.

Doctor Gaultier, following experiments, found, he declared, that the action of standing or walking on the toes is conducive to chest breathing as opposed to abdominal breathing. Many cases of consumption, he pointed out, have their origin in the fact that the upper lungs of abdominal breathers become diseased through lack of complete use—a condition from which the wearers of high-heeled shoes seldom suffer.

Tractor Which Walks.

A new type of tractor that has recently been developed has a series of legs and walks like a horse. There are four cranks, each having a set of four legs, giving the tractor sixteen legs on which it walks. In addition there are four wheels automatically operated by the tractor engine, so that they can be lowered to the roadbed, thus converting the machine into a motor truck. The feet are shod to conform to the ground conditions.

It is said that the tractor may be used to plow, seed, cultivate, harrow, mow and harvest, rake, furnish power for other machinery as a tractor and power plant and also to act as a truck for road work and heavy hauling.

Easy Job.

Interesting story, that about a man out of work, who is said to have been told by a friend, "I can get you a good job down at Fore River." "But I don't know anything about that," was the reply. "Oh," said the friend, "it will be an easy job, as an inspector. All you will have to do will be to walk around and look wise and draw your salary." Most Valuable of Coral.

In consideration of their slow growth, coral reefs are fished once only in ten years, the fishing boats engaged in this extremely lucrative business varying in size from three to fourteen tons, says an exchange. The most valuable fisheries are among the coral reefs of Tunisia, Algeria and Morocco, the raw material going chiefly to Italy. The red coral of the Mediterranean and the Red Sea is exported in large quantities to India for the manufacture of ornaments and articles of personal adornment. The black coral of the Persian gulf and Great Barrier reef is still more highly prized.
