#### OBITUARY

##### George Enoch Lundburg

George Enoch Lundburg was born at Paxton, Ford county, Illinois, on the 11th of February, 1870. Shortly afterward his parents moved to Chicago where they resided until about 1884 when they moved to Wayne, Nebraska. Here George finished his high school education, being valedictorian of his class.

After teaching school several years he entered the mercantile business, engaging in business at Wayne and later at Wakefield, Neb. On the 7th of April, 1897, in Chicago, he was married to Miss Sallie Conner. He then located at Bloomfield, Neb., later removing to Lyons, Neb., engaging in the mercantile business at each place. He came to Oregon in April, 1911, locating at Grants Pass. Besides his connection with the First National bank he held considerable financial interests in valuable properties in Grants Pass and vicinity. He was a prominent member of the Masonic fraternities of this city and an officer of Hillah Temple, Ashland. He was a member of the school board and took a deep interest in the matters of the public schools.

As a member of the park board he was greatly interested in the beautiful Riverside park, only last Friday evening making the presentation speech in behalf of the bank of the bandstand which the bank had built in the park.

As a member of the Chamber of Commerce he was actively interested in the promotion of the business interests of the city.

Mr. Lundburg was a member of the official board of Newman M. E. church, deeply spiritual in his life, a regular attendant at Sunday school and church services.

On Monday, August 23, he worked at the bank as usual until lunch time, went home, was sudden stricken in death.

Besides his loving wife he leaves a son, Harold, aged 17, and a daughter, Dorothy, aged 13, his aged mother residing in Portland, four brothers Elmer and Louis of Portland, and Edward and Arthur of Chicago one sister, Mrs. Wm. F. Will, of Stabler, Wash., and a great host of friends.

His passing was so unexpected we feel the truth of the poet's words:  
"No time for a last farewell,  
No time for the shock of fear,  
Scarcely a moment's halt on the shore,  
With the guide and the boatman near—  
And you found yourself where you longed to stand,  
In the repose of the fatherland."
