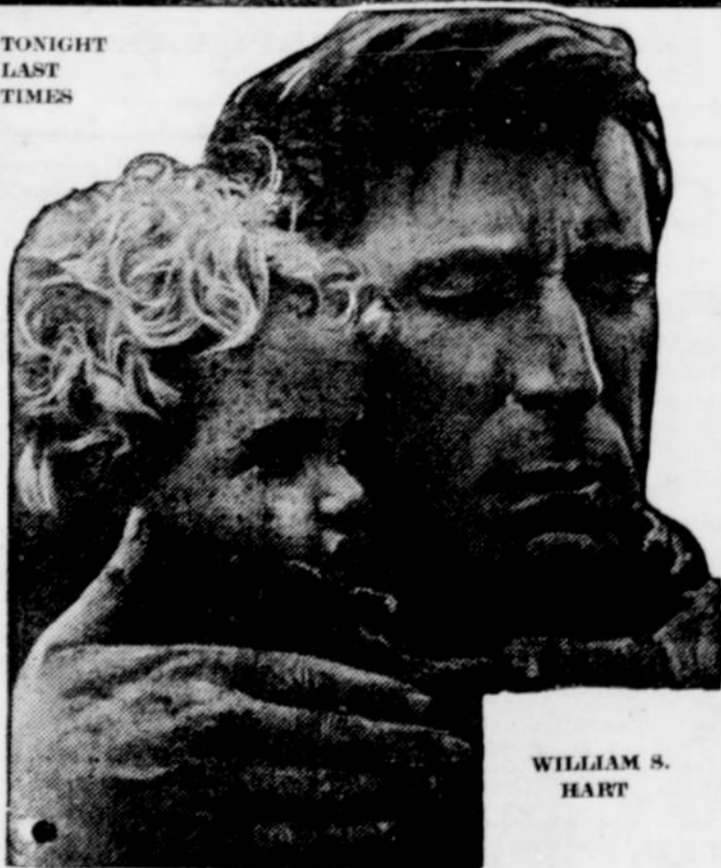

Ashland Will Vote—The Ashland city council has issued an official call for two special elections for bonding; the city for \$100,000 to provide an additional water supply.
