SUPPORTING MR. HARDING

Every indication points to the sure
election of Harding and Coolidge, the
republican nominees for the pres-
idency and vice presidency of the
United States. Straw ballots show
the drift of sentiment, and the vote
for the ticket will no doubt be over-
whelming. Oregon republicans pride
themselves upon having a republican
state. It is true that the vote of the
state has gone to the republican can-
didates for the presidency pretty con-
sistently, but beyond that the repub-
licans of Oregon have failed in their
duty by not always supporting their
choice for the chief position with a
congress of the same political faith.
A republican president with a demo-
cratic congress behind him is pretty
badly handicapped. If it is good poli-
tics to elect a republican to the pres-
idency, then it is good politics to give
him a congress that will support the
same political policies. Oregon can
never be classed as a republican state
until she quits nullifying her vote
for president by sending a split dele-
gation to the United States senate.
It is up to the republicans this fall
to redeem themselves, and to do it
they will have to send a solid repub-
lican delegation to congress.

JEWISH ASSEMBLY AT
JERUSALEM CONVENED

New York, Oct. 8.—The first Jew-
ish constituent assembly of Pales-
tine convened in Jerusalem yester-
day according to advice received at
the headquarters here of the Zionist
organization of America.

Although the labor element in the
assembly has a majority, no ultra-
radical legislation is expected. The
advice stated, the national radical
party being moderate and the "cap-
italist" group favoring modern social
innovations. Women delegates took
their seats notwithstanding Orthodox
protests, the advice added. The as-
sembly has the sanction of Sir Her-
bert Samuel, British high commis-
sioner to Palestine.

In the elections held last April
and not only did many women vote
but several were elected as delegates,
including two from Petach Tikvah,
oldest Jewish agricultural settlement
in Palestine.
