Take for instance the radical measure

that has for its meaning and effect

the establishment of a legal

rate of interest at 5 per cent. There

is already a legal rate established in

Oregon, and supply and demand has

kept the rate even below the established

rate. The law was established to

prevent usurious charges, and is

unnecessary in the usual course of

business. Business interests and industry

are disturbed, however, by the fear

that the radical element, aided by the

unthinking or uninformed, may enact

the measure into law, and so drive

capital out of Oregon, working

immense damage to all industry. That

there may be no excuse for lack of information

upon this and other measures, a delegation

of men from all parties is going about

the state speaking at public meetings

upon the measures, this delegation to be

in Grants Pass Wednesday evening. Every

voter should attend this meeting and hear

the arguments as presented by these men

who have made a study of the situation and know their subject.

One of these days the people of Oregon will wake up and find another freak law on the statute books. This time it is the 5 per cent interest bill which is the cause for worry. No one will loan money at 5 per cent if he can loan it at 8 in the next state. It is worth thinking over.
