THE DIVIDED SESSION

While it is best to become informed upon all the measures that are to appear upon the ballot at the November election, it is also well to follow the advice of voting against any measure that is not understood or upon which there is a doubt. This policy is going to defeat the majority of the measures that find their way upon the ballot, as it should. As a matter of fact, most of them ought to be defeated upon general principles, for radicals who can not get themselves elected to the legislature often initiate a bill and take a chance on getting enough votes to put it over. In case of a light vote cast at an election, a very small minority of the voting population can make a pernicious measure a law.

The initiative and the referendum are safety valves by which the public can protect itself in legislative matters. But ordinarily legislators are representative citizens of the community from which they come and bring the sentiment of their constituents with them. Especially would the legislature be fairly representative if the divided session measure was adopted. There is danger that the legislator loses touch with the sentiment of his constituency during the heat of a legislative session, and the breathing spell in the interim of the divided session will give him an opportunity to find himself again. The measures are introduced at the opening session, passed, and the legislators go home for a time. The measures do not become effective, however, and after the visit home, the legislators again convene, give further consideration to the measures, can repeal or amend them, but no new legislation at the final session can be enacted.
