OREGON INDUSTRY ENDANGERED

An effective campaign has been made in Oregon against the pernicious 5 per cent interest bill, and there should be no question about its defeat next election day. But this is the kind of a measure that every radical and bolshevik in the country will center his support upon, and like the snakes that creep about in the grass, it will be a menace till it is well killed. The borrower would like to get money for 5 per cent of course. So would the bread eater like to get his wheat at the old time calamity price of 35 cents per bushel and bacon at six cents per pound as we did when wages were around \$1.50 for ten hours of labor. As a matter of fact, interest rates are lower today than they were when wheat was 35 cents a bushel, and no doubt will be still lower as the business conditions of the country become stabilized and permanent. But it is not in the interest of the loaner of money that Oregon should scotch the 5 per cent snake on November 2nd. Oregon business and industry needs capital. It needs not only that capital now within the state, but in the development and upbuilding of the state it will require capital from outside, just as it has required capital from the outside in the past. The enactment of the measure will not only keep capital from seeking investment in Oregon, but it will drive that already here out of the state. It would absolutely crush Oregon industry.
