To the Editor:

The claim that a divided session will prevent the congestion of business coming at the last of the session as occurs now is erroneous, as I view the matter, it will only make a bad matter worse. For instance, during the first session of 40 days no bill can be disposed of finally, except appropriation bills, and bills can be introduced up to and including the last day and the same procedure as now obtains must occur before a bill can be passed over to the final session—the effect will be that at the end of the 40 day session there will be a great mass of bills to be disposed of that will be passed on with very little or no consideration with the hope that by some mysterious method they will solve themselves during the interval of 60 days before the final session of 10 days begins.

Now the fact is these bills will not solve themselves, they will simply hibernate in "inconspicuous dissidence" until resurrected for the 10 day session and the legislature will be confronted at that time with a mass of anywhere between 1000 and 1500 bills to be worked out in 10 days, or say 100 to 150 bills for each day. If there were no discussion on any of these bills how long will it take the reading clerk to call the roll in the house of 60 members 150 times a day? But there will be some discussion and some of the bills will require most of a day to dispose of them, so that on the 10th day when the session opens, the members will find on the calendar anywhere between 300 and 800 bills to be passed, thus making "confusion more confounded." The legislature needs more time than now allowed, everybody that knows anything about it will admit that, and the way to give more time is to give it. This bill allowing the session 60 days gives, and should be passed. This divided session bill originated from the same place that the 6 per cent tax limitation bill did, and I ask the taxpayers (who were assured by sponsors of that bill that it would keep down their taxes) when they pay their taxes next year just how much they think that their taxes have been kept down?
