A PERNICIOUS MEASURE

Compulsory vaccination has always been opposed by an element of the population that thought personal liberty was being trod upon. But authority has the right to enact legislation for the protection of the masses, and statutes are written that require the individual to meet certain conditions for the benefit not only of the individual but of the community as a whole. No one can have the right to do exactly as he pleases if the right he assumes is against public policy.

When science discovered that immunity from disease came from vaccination, the discovery was hailed as the greatest of the age. It has saved the lives of thousands of people, and with the other measures for proper quarantine, many of the most loathsome and dangerous diseases have been all but eradicated. There is some discomfort in submitting to vaccination, and occasionally bad results are obtained, but its benefits are a thousand fold greater than its disadvantages. Dr. Harvey Wiley, the noted health expert, on his recent visit to this state, in speaking of the proposed legislation, said: "Never before have I been in a community where matters pertaining to public health have been taken out of the hands of experts and put to a vote before the people. I do not think that a parent in this state who has children of school age will vote for this measure, because it means that the school children will be protected against contagious disease."

To defeat this pernicious measure, vote 313 NO.

RECEIPT GIVEN FOR CANNING MUSHROOMS

Miss Corbett has given out the following receipt for canning mushrooms:  
Caution: Unless you are absolutely sure that you know a mushroom when you see it, do not run the risk of gathering and using for food what you think are mushrooms. A large number of persons are poisoned every year because of carelessness in this regard. Many very poisonous plants closely resemble edible mushrooms. Can mushrooms immediately after picking; if allowed to stand they become unfit for use.

Wash and trim the mushrooms. If small, can them whole; if large, they may be cut into sections. Blanch the mushrooms in boiling water 5 minutes. Remove and plunge them quickly into very cold water. Pack in hot glass jars and add boiling water to cover; add one level teaspoonful of salt to the quart. Place rubbers and caps of jars in position, not tight. Sterilize for the length of time given below for the particular type of outfit used:  
Water bath homemade or commercial, 90 minutes. Water seal, 214 degrees, 80 minutes. 5 pounds steam pressure, 50 minutes. 15 pounds steam pressure, 30 minutes.

Remove the jars, tighten covers; invert jars to cool, and test the joints. Wrap jars in paper. If canning in tin, always use lacquered cans. Do not fall to blanch and cold dip mushrooms before packing. After opening containers, remove the mushrooms immediately and use them as quickly as possible.
