FARM STOCK

MARKETING SHEEP AND HOGS

Federal Trade Commission Furnish Figures Showing Cost of Loading and Shipping.

Of 54 carloads of sheep including 11 single-deck and 43 double-deck cars, the cost of loading and bedding cars averaged \$0.019 per 100 pounds live weight, according to figures furnished the federal trade commission by the United States department of agriculture. Other marketing expenses, including freight, varied from \$0.239 to \$1.97 per hundredweight. The shrinkage in weight varied from 3.53 to 8.57 per cent, the majority of the shipments averaged approximately eight per cent.

Similar records on 253 carloads of hogs showed the cost of loading and bedding to average 1.5 cents per 100 pounds live weight; feed at market approximately 8 to 9 cents; commission charges 4 to 10 cents; miscellaneous expense, 2 to 10 cents, averaging approximately 5 cents; and the total cost of marketing, including freight from varying districts, approximately from 33 to 50 cents. The shrinkage in weight on 573 carloads of hogs varied from 9.88 to minus 4.59 per cent.

AVOID USING "MIXED" BULLS

Esteem With Which Purebred Sires Are Regarded Is Indicated by Texas Cattleman.

"I have nothing but purebred Hereford bulls, have been breeding registered Hereford bulls for 35 years, and have never used any mixed breed or grade."

This statement addressed to the United States department of agriculture by a Texas stockman, who recently joined the "Better Sires—Better Stock" campaign, indicates the esteem with which purebred sires are

regarded in Brown county, Tex., where he lives. In addition to his herd of 245 cattle, this stock owner listed 700 goats, 600 sheep, and 30 swine, kept for breeding purposes.

MOST VALUABLE SHEEP FEED

Rye Stands at Head of Cereals in Protein Content, but Lacking in Carbohydrates.

Whether fed as a grain ration, pastured, or cut and fed for hay, rye holds a high place for feeding pregnant ewes at weaning time. In its chemical analysis, rye stands at the head of the cereals in protein content, but is somewhat lower in carbohydrates than wheat or corn.

This suggests two things in regard to its feeding value: First, to feed in combination with other things lacking in protein but rich in fat-forming elements, like corn and wheat. Second, as a feed for young animals in which a high development of bone and muscle is required. For either purpose it is highly satisfactory. When sheep are wintered largely on fodder, timothy hay, or other roughage, the rye partly makes up for the lack of protein.

CHEAP PRODUCTION OF PORK

One of the Best Ways Is Use of Stubble Fields After Grain Has Been Cut in Autumn.

One of the cheapest ways of producing pork is the use of the stubble fields after the grain has been cut in the fall. In spite of all that can be done there is more or less grain scattered on the ground during the process of cutting and stacking. Hogs will pick this up and produce excellent gains without any additional grain.

DIVIDED PASTURES FOR HOGS

Animals Thrive Much Better on Young Tender Shoots Than on Old Hardened Stalks.

It has been found repeatedly that hogs will do better on the young tender shoots than on the old hardened stalks. For that reason it is advisable to divide the pastures so that the hogs can be shifted from one to the other at intervals of a week or ten days.

Later, in "Around the World in Eighty Days," Jules Verne brought his hero to his club in triumph just as the clocks of London were striking ten minutes to twelve!

Lemon Corn Remedy.

When a corn is bothersome take a lemon, cut off a small piece, then nick it so as to let in the toe with the corn; tie this on at night so that it cannot move, and in the morning you will find that, with a blunt knife, you may remove a considerable part of the corn. Make two or three applications, and great relief will result.

Growing Plants on Sponge.

An interesting experiment is the growing of plants on an old sponge. Procure an old sponge and, after soaking it in water, sprinkle in the holes a mixture of cress, mustard, rape, wheat and grass or flax seeds. Now suspend this sponge in the window of a light and warm room. Very soon the seeds germinate and in a week or two the entire sponge will be clothed with a mass of beautiful foliage. The sponge must be kept moist.
