

NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. Seven of Josephine County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said District will be held at Junior High School on the 20th day of November, 1920, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, election at 2 o'clock p. m., to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.
