## WHAT TO DO WHEN BATTERY RUNS LOW

The annoyance of having the storage battery of ones car run down, putting lights and starter out of commission and damaging the battery itself, can be avoided if the motorist will give his Battery the periodical attention it demands. If he doesn't at least he should be able to diagnose his trouble when it occurs.

Yet the ounce of prevention is better, for otherwise the life of the Battery is materially shortened. If your lights are dim you may be pretty sure your battery is running down. Probably the reason is that you have not been running the engine enough to keep the Battery charged. Several other things may happen. The generator may not be charging, or there may be a wire short-circuited.

If the Battery has run down because the car has been laid up or scarcely used then the remedy is to run the engine and charge the Battery that way. If running the engine does not charge the Battery then the service station should look for the trouble.

What ever the defect, it should be found and repaired.

Delay always results in damage to the Battery, and consequent expensive repair bills. Every motorist should have a hydrometer; just for emergency, for he should depend on his service station for his inspections.

The specific gravity readings on this instrument gives the approximate condition of your Battery. Here in our Battery Service Station we are so interested, that we gladly re- fill anybody's Battery free of charge

Distilled water should be added to the Battery every two weeks in summer and once a month in winter. Never let the water get below the top of the plates as this causes serious injury to the Battery. Some motorists seem to think that adding water to their Battery during the cold weather makes it more liable to freeze, but such is not the case for if your Battery is kept charged it will not freeze.

If the water in your Battery evaporates too rapidly it is almost certain that the generator is overcharging the Battery and that the charging rate should be checked by your service station.

#### Man's Daily Food Needs.

The average daily food consumption of an adult man is placed by Raymond Pearl at 114 grammes of protein, 127 of fat, and 433 of carbohydrate—supplying a total energy of 3,424 calories. Grains yield 35 per cent of the calories of energy in the American diet, meats 22, dairy products 15, sugars 13, vegetables 5, vegetable oils and nuts 5, poultry, 2, fruits, 2. Of the protein, 36 per cent is derived from grains, and 26 from meats; of the fat, 51 per cent is supplied by meats (40 by pork), and 27 by dairy products; and of the carbohydrates, 56 per cent comes from grains, and 26 from sugars.

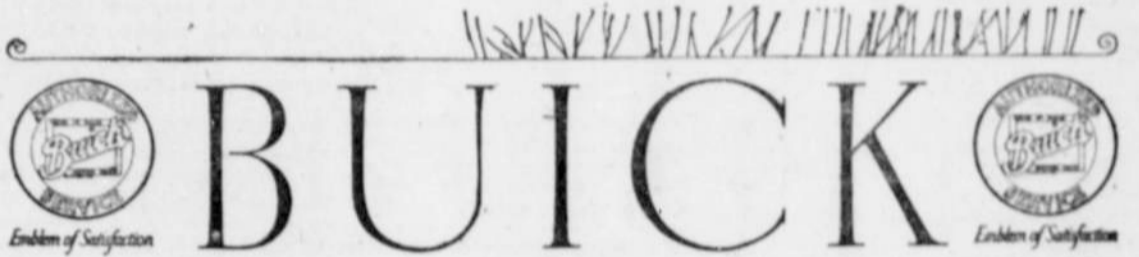
