Assessment is Lowered

County Assessor Elcus Pollock has received word that the assessment this year is to be based upon 87 per cent of the true value of the property. Last year the amount was 68 per cent. This means that a small amount of money will be lost on the assessment on public utilities.

Floating Body Seen

Nothing more has been heard of the body which was seen floating in the Rogue at the mouth of Boote creek last Thursday. The body was seen by a mail carrier about 10 miles above Alameda. It was reported to the forestry office, who notified the sheriff's office. As far as can be ascertained there has been no one reported missing along the Rogue.

Roy Reed Found Dead

Coroner Loughridge was notified this morning of the finding of a body at Leland. In company with Sheriff Lewis, Ernest Lister and W. T. Miller, he went to Leland and found the body to be that of Roy Reed, who resided near there. The inquest found that he died from the effects of some whiskey, which he had been drinking. A partly filled

bottle was found near him. The deceased man was about 25 years of age.

Summers Makes Run

Reports from the Oregon-O. A. C. football game Saturday give space to the playing of Stanley Summers, a former Grants Pass boy, now playing on the O. A. C. football team as half-back. Summers intercepted a forward pass thrown by Oregon and ran 48 yards through a scattered field. His playing all though the game was given a large amount of praise. The results of the game, nothing to nothing, surprised local football fans, most of whom had Oregon doped to win. The University of California, by their win over Stanford Saturday wins the right to play the eastern team at Pasadena on New Years. It has not yet been decided whether Harvard or Princeton will come west.

Body Found This Morning

Considerable excitement was caused this morning by the finding of the body of George Tryon, of Crescent City, who apparently died late last night. The body was found under a pine tree on South Sixth street near M. It was lying under a tree full length as if death had come suddenly. Last evening Mr. Tryon was seen walking around the streets and he said that he had been walking in the corridor of the Layton hotel where he was stopping and was asked to make less noise. He was unable to sleep and went outside. It is thought that he went down Sixth street at that time and was then stricken. Letters in his pockets were addressed to himself at Springfield, where he is known to have relatives.

OBITUARY
J. S. MacMurray

Funeral services for J. S. MacMurray were held yesterday from the Methodist church. He was born on May 13, 1867, at Paisley, Scotland. Death coming November 16, at San Jose, Cal., where he had gone with Mrs. MacMurray for the benefit of his health which had been failing. Professor MacMurray received a musical education in London, coming to the

United States 30 years ago. He had made Grants Pass his home for the past 12 years during which time he had been an instructor in music until about three years ago when his health began to fail. He was a leader in all musical organizations here. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. J. S. MacMurray, of Grants Pass, and by a sister, Mrs. Nickson, of Almont, Mich.

LUMBER REMAINS PROPERTY OF G. P. IRRIGATION DISTRICT

During the recent flood in the river which began on November 17th, several thousand feet of new lumber to be used in the construction of the Savage Rapids dam were carried away by the current and floated down stream where considerable of it lodged along the banks of the stream. This lumber consisted principally of new 2x6, 2x12, 4x6 and 6x12s. The 2x6 and 2x12 lumber was surfaced one side and two edges and the 4x6 was surfaced four sides.

The Shattuck Construction Co. has detailed men to recover this lumber. They have been reliably informed that certain persons have retrieved this material and hauled same away. Their operatives have been gathering information which will lead to the return of the larger part of this lumber, and the Grants Pass Irrigation District will appreciate information leading to the whereabouts of that portion not yet located.

There was also carried away by the flood waters one 6" centrifugal pump and one vertical 3 h. p. gasoline engine, both of which were carried down stream below the dam where they have been located.

We have been informed that legally this remains the property of the Grants Pass Irrigation District, and persons hauling away any of this lumber are doing so at their own expense.
