Precipitation Is Heavy—
The rainfall during the past few days has amounted to a regular downpour. Last night from 5 o'clock until 9:30 this morning, 1.12 inches of rain fell, being the greatest precipitation in one day that has been recorded for a number of years. Since the 11th of the month, 6.59 inches of rain has fallen. The average precipitation for November is given at 4.97 inches. In 1919 the November rainfall amounted to 3.19 inches and in 1918 it was 3.06 inches. Last year the total rainfall amounted to 20.83 inches compared to 23.61 inches of the year previous. If the precipitation continues as at present the record of a number of years will be beaten.
