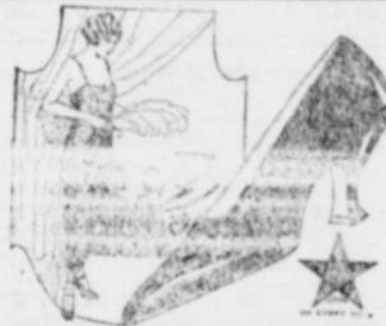

Imitating Mahogany.
