so underpaid as that of farming. The reason can be found in the fact that the farmer must give his personal attention and time to the production of the crop, while its marketing, just as essential a part of the industry, must be left without a thought-out program. This has meant that the middlemen have reaped the benefit, prices have been forced down through the competition of one producer with another, and profits failed to appear.

The program now being provided by the Bureau will give the marketing of the product the same thought that has been required in its production. Marketing means the finding of the market and the wise distribution of the produce. This can only result through cooperation, just such cooperation as the Farm Bureau proposes. It is immensely better than the plan that had been proposed of having a state market master, created as a part of a political machine. The latter partakes too much of the paternalistic spirit, for the producers are well able to handle the matter for themselves. We have seen the raisin growers and the prune growers and the producers of the citrus fruits grow rich through cooperation. The apple growers and the pear growers and the producers of any farm product will find the cooperative movement just as beneficial.

Dried Mummies as Medicine.

Animal products were much used in medicine from the sixteenth to the eighteenth century. Dried mummy was a favorite remedy. The importation of mummy was an industry of some commercial importance and several writers of that day caution against the use of spurious mummy, giving directions as to what distinguishes the good from the poor product. There was much substitution, and one dealer was found to have done an extensive trade in bodies dried in imitation of the genuine article.—National Geographic Society Bulletin
