STATE ENGINEER VISITS

estimated the Grants Pass project as involving costs exceeding a million dollars. He added that all the projects at this time were confronted with the same high cost problems as Grants Pass, and to aid in meeting the situation here he would not only give personal attention to it, but would detail Engineer Strickland, from the Salem office, to come to Grants Pass and help in the promoting of the work for the district.

While here Mr. Cupper went over the estimates for the completion of the work with the engineers. These estimates indicate that, under present cost conditions, it will require a further bond issue of \$500,000 to complete the project. An alternative plan of authorization of an issue of \$400,000 was considered, this to complete the project except for the main gravity canal, which could be provided for later, this not in any way to interfere with the watering of all the lands of the project in the meantime. After full discussion, however, the board felt that it was best to have the entire possible requirement authorized at one election, and with the cooperation of the state engineer's office to reduce the costs as much below the estimates as possible. Mr. Cupper said that he could not, from the examination which he had made, advise where these reductions could come, but that Mr. Strickland would at once work with the local engineers to that end.

The election for the authorization of the bond issue and for the state guarantee of interest has been called for Monday, the 3rd day of January, and will be for the \$500,000 indicated by the estimates, though the state engineer's office and the irrigation securities commission will permit issuance of only such part as may be required to finish the project with the exercise of utmost economy.

With this closer cooperation of the state engineer and his force, there should be no occasion for doubt upon the part of the community, for the work will be prosecuted with all the energy and economy possible in an undertaking of such magnitude. The attitude of all, financiers, builders and promoters of the project is that the project shall be made ready in due time to serve the lands of the district for next season according to program.
