Dry dusting of wood floors merely circulates the dust. Calol Liquid Gloss removes it, brightening and renewing the floors and keeping them really clean and sanitary. Polishing Varnished Floor.

To polish a varnished floor, rub well with equal quantities of beeswax and turpentine. Another method is to take equal parts of olive oil and spirits of turpentine, wet a soft cloth with these, rub the wood hard, then rub with a dry cloth. This is also good for black walnut furniture and sewing machines.

Art of Staining Glass.

Fifty years ago the old secret of staining glass, which was lost with the decline of art in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, was rediscovered and, with the aid of chemistry, has made remarkable progress.
